Architectural Review Committee

I would like to welcome our latest Architectural Review Committee (ARC) member, Paula Caro, who joined in December! She has lived in Cameron Station for many years and brings a wealth of knowledge to the committee thanks to her 17 years of experience as an architect. Paula filled our only remaining vacancy, bringing the ARC to full strength.

With spring in our thoughts if not yet in our sights, residents typically begin to plan improvements to their yard. Don't forget that all substantial yard improvements must conform to the guidelines established in the Cameron Station Community Association Design and Maintenance Standards (DMS) and must be approved by the ARC **before** you begin work. If the improvements you're considering come close to your property line, the DMS requires that applications to the ARC include a site survey/plat describing the boundaries of your property. A plat is usually included with your deed at settlement when you purchase your property.

There has also been heightened discussion online about security in Cameron Station relating to auto and package theft. If you are considering adding a doorbell camera or other type of security camera to your home, it must conform to the DMS and receive approval from the ARC prior to installation. To ensure approval, you should do your best to match the color of the camera to the trim where it is mounted and ensure that all cabling is neatly secured and out of sight as much as possible.

In fact, if you are making any changes to your home that can be seen from the outside of the house, you will probably need to submit those proposed changes to the ARC for approval **before** beginning work. **Always begin your planning by consulting the DMS.** The forms necessary to submit an Exterior Modification Application or a Private Tree Replacement Application, along with the latest version of the DMS, are located here: *cameronstation.org/ourneighborhood/hoa-services-fees/covenants.* If you have any questions about the process or which changes require an application, contact: *Arc@cameronstation.org.*

Common Area Committee

The committee has moved ahead with proposals/contracts for several new projects.

• The Gazebo has some wood in poor condition that needs to be replaced, in addition to being repainted.

• More replacement trees were planted in December, before the ground was frozen.

• The large street repaving project will require a level of technical management beyond what the CAMP staff or committees can do; several engineering companies have submitted proposals to do this work.

• Sections of fence between the community and shopping centers have been in poor repair for some time, and they will be fixed.

• The community street light poles originally had identifying letters and numbers to make it easier to report lights that were out. Over time, many of these numbers have faded or worn off. The Committee reviewed a contract to replace the pole numbers.

• This Spring, the brick wall along Duke Street will be power washed to remove the dark mold.

Watch for daffodils in the gardens along Duke Street in the spring. There are also daffodils coming in many community flowerbeds. These start to sprout in winter. Many common area plant beds have become cut-throughs; this time of year they appear to be only dirt, but dormant perennials and future bulbs are actually in these places. Walking or playing in these areas damages the plants. Please stay off them and walk around the plant beds. Thank you!

Financial Advisory Committee

Community Association Management Professionals (known as CAMP), our management company, provides a detailed system of financial recordkeeping and reporting. Each month, the Financial Advisory Committee (FAC) members receive the same financial reports provided to the Board of Directors in both summary and detailed form. These reports are fund-based with separate reports for the Operating Fund, the Replacement Fund and the Capital Improvement Fund. They include an updated Income Statement and Balance Sheet, along with management commentary on actual versus budgeted expenditures. We address questions directly to the community manager, but also identify points we feel should receive specific attention from the Board. The Board and the FAC also have access to the online system (CIRANET) that includes financial reports with up-to-date expenditure tracking for operating expenditures as well as repair and replacement and capital projects.

So many people have stepped up to help our community. Wearing masks and social distancing is the rule and not the exception in Cameron Station; it means more than



Annual Meeting Draws Large Virtual Audience

On Monday, November 9, the 2020 Annual Meeting of the Cameron Station Community Association was held via Zoom. There were 171 registered attendees, and a total of 403 ballots were received for the Board of Directors election.

Three new members were elected: Ernest Cage, Megan Christensen and Greg Hillson. They will join current members Andrew Hill, Joan Lampe, Mike Johnson and Sarah Walsh in forming the 2021 board. Congratulations to Ernest, Megan and Greg, and thank you to all who applied for this very important volunteer position.

Speakers at the meeting included Mayor Justin Wilson, who provided current information on the city's Covid-19 response and restrictions, including testing sites and proposals for reopening schools. He also discussed plans for redevelopment of the Landmark Mall site, which has been a multi-decade effort. (Updated information is available on Page 12.)



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Lt. Matthew Weinart, our liaison to the Alexandria Police Department, reported that the number of incidents where police were contacted in the last 12 months was 96, down from 106 for the same time period in 2019. The largest number of incidents involved larcenies – packages from doors, bikes from open garages and items from cars which were often left unlocked.

The winners of the Mark Pillow Community Spirit Award and Volunteer of the Year were announced. (*Please see separate articles on pages 4 and 5.*)

Various committee chairs reported on their projects and activities, and Board Treasurer Joan Lampe gave an update on the 2020 budget and audit, the 2021 budget and the overall sound financial position of the community. She reminded residents that Cameron Station is more than 20 years old, and we can expect some major expenses down the road as the community continues to age.

Topics covered in the Resident Open Forum included Ring cameras, leaf collection, improving community communication, storm drain dangers, speeding cars and how to improve attendance at meetings.

Board meetings in 2021 are scheduled for the fourth Tuesday of every month, with the exception of November and December, dates of which will be announced. There is a Resident Open Forum at every meeting, and residents are encouraged to attend.

November 10 Civic Association Meeting

There was a very good turnout at the last general membership meeting of the Cameron Station Civic Association, which was held virtually via Zoom on Tuesday, November 10. Three great speakers/organizations joined us for a discussion on the Landmark Overlook development, what was happening in the City of Alexandria with respect to Covid-19 and the Taylor Run Stream Restoration project.

Landmark Overlook

Ken Wire, principal of Wire Gill LLP, and Chris Bell, Senior Vice President, Acquisition and Development for Hekemain & Co., Inc., discussed the initial plans for the Landmark Overlook development. The project is located on an 8.2-acre site bounded by South Whiting Street, Stevenson Avenue and South Walker Street, near Landmark Mall and the Mini Cooper dealership at the southwest corner of South Walker and Stephenson streets. The initial plans call for 88 stacked condos, two seven-story apartment buildings with a total of 360 units, two buildings that will be a hotel and/or office building depending upon what happens at Landmark Mall, and 7,000 square feet of retail. It's hoped that this project will come before the city for approval in March.

Covid-19

Natalie Talis, Population Health Manager for the Alexandria Health Department, provided details on Covid-19 and its impact on Alexandria. As of November 7, 2020, the city had 4,481 cases, 332 hospitalizations and 76 deaths. By early December 2020, one out of 13 persons with Covid needed hospitalization. The most common sources of exposure to the coronavirus are household (44%), workplace (25%) and gatherings (10%). When a vaccine rolled out, it was first provided to healthcare professionals and first responders and then to high-risk individuals such as seniors and those with serious health conditions. The current vaccines require two shots and must be stored in ultra-cool freezers. Taylor Run Stream Restoration

Jesse Maines, Division Chief for the City of Alexandria Department of Transportation & Environmental Services and the Stormwater Management program, and Brian Rahal, Civil Engineer IV/Section Lead for the department, provided background and an update on the Taylor Run Stream Restoration project, part of the cleanup effort involving the Chesapeake Bay that is mandated by law. Climate change and redevelopment in the city that occurred prior to stormwater management requirements have caused certain streams in the city to erode at rapid rates and dump nitrogen, phosphorous and sediment into the waterways that feed into the Chesapeake Bay. Heavy stream flows during rainfall events have caused erosion that damages streams and undermines trees on the banks. The city is in the process of conducting public outreach to address concerns raised by the Civic Association and others about adequately protecting wetlands and habitat along Taylor Run, as well as mitigating tree removal impacts. It's currently anticipated that the actual stream restoration will commence this fall and take about one year to complete. A Hybrid Learning Model for ACPS

The fate of Alexandria's public schools reopening for in-person learning continues to be up in the air, as administrators monitor community health metrics in anticipation of a possible reentry in February.

In December, parents and guardians of Alexandria City Public Schools students were asked to fill out a family choice form indicating their preference for their children to continue online education or transition into a phased hybrid model.

As it stands, the tentative reentry plan for students in the hybrid model would involve attending in-person classes two days a week with three days of virtual learning. Grocery Shopping in 2020

The food industry and supermarket associations that track grocery shopping trends discovered that the pandemic did more than just force us to buy more groceries and stay at home and cook: there was a significant shift to ordering groceries online, some for pick-up, but mostly

for delivery. While shoppers remained loyal to their stores, the early shortages led to a notable increase in subscriptions for products used regularly. Whether it was from bottled water, over-thecounter drugs, diapers, paper products or whatever, shoppers wanted to ensure a regularly delivered supply. The clubs where they could stock up on items also gained new members. Those who went into grocery stores made fewer trips and

spent less time in the stores. It was more common for one person to shop for the family groceries. These trends are expected to continue for the near future.

Food Trends

While staying in and cooking at home, in 2020 the focus was on comfort food, going with the tried and true, and using familiar name brands. That will continue, with some tweaks to address kitchen fatigue.

• Home cooks are ready to take virtual cooking classes to up their game, including trying international dishes. Look for online cocktail classes as well.

• More and different spices are being used to freshen up a meal or experiment with international cuisines. Retail grocers report increased requests for spices from North Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean. On occasion, home cooks are trying a restaurant-like experience at home for a change of pace.

• After a year of adjusting to cooking at home, there still will be comfort food but with a healthier twist – lasagna with veggie noodles and cauliflower rice in stir fries will remain as a trend.

• Plant-based food was coming into its own in 2020 and is expected to explode in 2021 in grocery stores and restaurants. The Whole Foods on Duke Street now has a Vegan PLNT burger bar. McDonald's has announced that it will offer a McPlant burger in 2021.

• Hemp is another plant-based alternative; it fits into keto, paleo and vegan diets.

• Almond and oat milk surged in popularity during the pandemic with no sign of letting up. Starbucks started offering oat milk in January 2021 and will launch in all stores this spring.

• Coffee will likely be the flavor of the year. You will get a coffee-flavor jolt in your nutritional bars, granola and yogurt. All these coffee treats may well contain oat milk. Coffee-infused beer was popular during the December holidays.

• Hard seltzers reigned in 2020 and are branching out to beer and cocktail seltzers. Hard kombucha seltzers are right behind in 2021. When we are able to return to

bars, this trend will probably spread there. Think of getting a bucket of wine seltzers instead of beers while watching the game. Sales of canned wine skyrocketed in 2020, and canned cocktails are right behind. Cocktails-togo from restaurants likely will last, but when bars open, will canned wine and cocktails make the transition to bars? It looks like another tough year for craft distilleries.

Return to the New Normal

When we really feel comfortable again, what's the first eatery you will go to? None of the experts are predicting wild parties with dirty martinis, caviar and ice sculptures. Many believe the first adult outing will be a steakhouse. Think high-quality meat, planked salmon or scallops with a huge baked potato, fancy adult beverages, and outrageous desserts.

After that, tasting menus and wine pairings with tastes and ingredients different from home cooking likely will be popular, starting with small groups and private events. There's a lot to look forward to!

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Adopt-a-Family

That Annoying Eye Twitch

Have you ever wondered why, at certain times, your eyes may twitch? Not to worry, as this isn't usually a serious condition. There are a multitude of reasons people experience eye twitching. The most common are eyestrain, fatigue, stress, alcohol consumption and caffeine. Other causes are working in front of a computer screen all day or not getting enough magnesium or potassium in your diet.

Eye twitching usually goes away within a few days or weeks if you get proper rest and find ways to relieve stress. Cutting back on caffeine will also help. If you're having them more often, benign essential blepharospasm is a possible cause. In rare instances, eye twitching may indicate an underlying health condition.

Eye twitches are common – just make sure you stay hydrated and get plenty of rest, and no one will think you're winking at them.



INOVA ALEXANDRIA TO MOVE TO LANDMARK MALL SITE

According to a press release from the City of Alexandria, Inova Alexandria Hospital will be moving to Landmark Mall site. Inova will occupy about 11 acres, which leaves the remaining 40 acres for "residential, retail, commercial, and entertainment offerings integrated into a cohesive neighborhood with a central plaza, a network of parks and public spaces, and a transit hub serving bus rapid transit (BRT), DASH, and Metrobus." The construction is targeted to start in 2023, with the first private housing/ businesses to be delivered in 2025. The hospital is scheduled to be completed in early 2028.

The Origin of "The Compass"

The Cameron Station community was just beginning when the community newsletter was founded. We can't think of a better way to start the 21st year of its publishing than by sharing the story of how The Compass got its name. Having been on the original Newsletter Committee (the forerunner of the Communications Committee), I was fortunate enough to work with former neighbor Erin Wetherald, who wrote an article entitled "Naming the Newsletter" for the June 2000 issue. Most of what follows is thanks to her.

The Committee spent a lot of time meeting, thinking, scribbling, debating and voting on about 50 different names for the newsletter. We started with simple yet descriptive names, such as Cameron Station Community News.

We contemplated a name conveying a railroad connection, The Cameron Station Local, but decided that folks might not want to be reminded that they lived next to railroad tracks, especially because some are reminded of that every night. Speaking of a connection, however, led us to consider The Connection as another candidate - except some of the staff grew up watching "The Love Connection" on TV and didn't want the newsletter to be mistaken for a matchmaking service! (Besides which, a group of local newspapers was also The original staff of The Compass gathers in 2000 using the name.)

We also considered *The Current* because of our proximity to several runs but discovered that another community association's newsletter already used that name. And so it went...

Then we began reflecting upon the history of Cameron Station as a U.S. Army base. The Bugle emerged and guickly became a favorite with several members. However,

we decided to regroup and think of more names and vote again the next time we met.

At a third meeting, we narrowed the field down to three names and cast our final vote. With one person on vacation, we were down to six voting members, causing an even split among The Bugle, The Compass and The Communicator. We each ranked those names in order of preference, and The Compass prevailed.

So Why "The Compass"?

Well, it's an icon that clearly denotes a sense of direction. And tying into Cameron Station's past, it's a tool that army soldiers have relied upon to get their bearings in the field. That got us thinking about how the mission of the Newsletter Committee was to help impart a sense of direction to Cameron Station residents, enabling them to maintain their bearings in our community through the news and information we would communicate through The Compass.

And finally, the name "The Compass" represents the fact that we have all come to Cameron Station from every directional point and found our bearings and sense of belonging in this very special community.

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






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Put a Lid on Garbage

It's large, spacious, attractive and has a sizable patio with flowers, umbrellas and plenty of heaters. Given the distancing challenges of Covid-19 and winter temperatures, what a bonus to find a great place where you can eat al fresco, stay warm and park for free! If sitting outside in the winter is not your cup of tea, you'll be happy to know about Silver Diner's hospital-grade air purification system with germicidal UV-C lights in the HVAC, UV-C fixtures and dining room air purifiers. Staff members are equipped to explain this state-of-the-art system to you, as well as their other safety precautions. More details are provided on the Silver Diner website, shown on Page 17.

I had the opportunity to chat with *Silver Diner's* Chief Operating Officer, our Cameron Station neighbor Glenn D'Amore. Glenn is excited with *Silver Diner's* evolving cuttingedge concepts in Alexandria. It's the "Diner for the Next Generation"! Glenn has helped lead the company into its current incarnation, and his passion is contagious. Managers are excited to greet customers, servers are excited to work there, and customers are excited for the experience.

Silver Diner's Co-Founder and Executive Chef, Ype Von Hengst, has created an expansive, inclusive, healthy, flexitarian (aka semi-vegetarian) menu with over 100 options. Explore the seasonal menu changes every six months. Listings are clearly flagged as low fat/cholesterol, vegetarian, vegan and gluten-free. There are so many options that it would behoove you to do some menu perusing in advance. I'll share with you some of the more innovative menu options based on my picks and Glenn's recommendations, but bear in mind that this is just the tip of the iceberg!

Breakfast/Brunch items are available all day, every day. Options include Quinoa Coconut Pancakes, Caramel French



Toast, Avocado Toast & Eags, Bison Huevos Rancheros and the Brussels Sprouts & Hummus Bowl. I love the appetizers, which also make great happy hour noshing, and my faves just happen to score a happy hour discount. I enjoy the Avocado Toast (add smoked salmon), Crispy Fried Brussels Sprouts (with dried apricots, cranberries and pecans) and Chicken Sliders. Artistic salads include the Warm Roasted Local Veggie Salad, the Ancient Grain Shrimp Bowl and the Lemony Hummus Greek Salad & Cauliflower Pita Bowl. If you're in the mood for a sandwich, the Pesto Burger, Flash-Fried Cauliflower Sub and the Wasabi Salmon Sliders sound tasty. Intriguing entrées include the Chicken Pot Pie, Mushroom Piccata and Tarragon Crab Cakes. For dessert, indulge in the Signature Apple Pie, Smith Island Cake (rarely found in these parts), Churro Doughnut Sundae or Double Chocolate Triple-Layer Cake (do the math: is that sextuple chocolate?). You can also splurge on a Hand-Dipped Breyers Shake.

Silver Diner has a fully stocked bar to which we will hopefully soon be bellying-up. The Watermelon-Cucumber Mimosa is a recent addition. On their café-style patio, some neighbors have been seen partaking of their impressive happy hour deals, weekdays 3-7pm, featuring discounted craft beer, wine, craft cocktails and appetizers, with specials starting at \$4. On Wednesdays, bring the pooch and partake in Pups on

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Nach Hause Zurückkehren...Rentrer à la Maison... Volver a Casa... No Matter How You Say It, Carpenter's Shelter Is "Coming Home"!

On December 10, Carpenter's Shelter turned the page to begin a new chapter of its story. We cut the ribbon on our recently completed building at 930 North Henry Street, and we officially entered our new home. But to be accurate, it's not really a new home; it's our longstanding location with a new purpose-built shelter developed on it. A congressman, a governor, a mayor, as well as board members and staff bearing cowbells and confetti were virtually present for a ribbon-cutting ceremony that energetically announced our return to this familiar spot.

We have much to celebrate! With a brand new industrial kitchen with walk-in freezer, stoves and a pantry, resident meals can be prepped and cooked on site. This is a marked change from our very limited culinary capacity at our temporary Landmark location. We have a true classroom for learning, a computer room with multiple screens for residents, a library and a wonderfully quiet outdoor courtyard and secure playground. Resident feedback on the new space is overwhelmingly positive, especially for

the abundance of natural light, which they missed while in the Landmark space. Every shelter room now has a window.

While we are thrilled to have our shelter operating in intentionally designed space, we are equally thrilled to have expanded our service offerings to include permanent supportive housing, a solution to chronic homelessness. By adding 10 of these types of apartments to the affordable housing in the top five floors of the building, we have moved 10 hard-to-house people home for the holidays! These 10 people had been with Carpenter's for long periods of time – nine years on average. They had many things contributing to their extended homelessness and had (in some cases) been through the "system" several times. In short, they needed help. Our permanent supportive housing units became their long-term solution, and we will work with them to maintain it.

So, although we're turning the page to a new chapter, our story is far from over. We bring back to our longtime

location a firsthand appreciation for the warm welcome and engagement that Cameron Station residents and others in the West End offered to us over our two-and-a-half-year stint in the old Macy's building. And, we invite you to stay with us - come to see our new space as pandemic-related

Reflections on the Pandemic

I've been tracking the impact of the pandemic on local businesses. The following may not reflect every change, but it is a good indicator of the impact on Alexandria.

Those Who Thrived in the Pandemic

It goes without saying that retail grocery stores and Amazon are among those who had a banner year, but so did some other businesses. The Wall Street Journal reports that rentals of recreational vehicles - travel trailers and motor homes – has spiked. Netflix and other streaming services reflect increased sales. The local Channel 8 News had segments on bikes and boats: Local bike shops struggled to meet the high demand for new bikes and saw a significant increase in repairing and refurbishing older ones. Good deals on boats also provided another way to get out while still social distancing.

The Virginia ABC reported a \$117 million increase in revenues as of October. (Newsletters from the Culinary Institute of America, however, note that wineries have lost considerable revenue, as their best customers – the restaurants – have purchased far less wine this year. Their tasting rooms and retail outlets also have suffered. Ditto for local distilleries, some of which moved to produce hand sanitizers instead.)

Other national chain stores are downsizing, resulting in closure of their stores in Alexandria: Sur La Table and Francesca's (women's clothing) closed in Old Town and GNC closed in the West End. Tuesday Morning closed locally.

The Pandemic in Alexandria at the End of 2020

It's good to see that new restaurants and businesses were willing to invest and open in Alexandria during the pandemic. It gives hope for the future.

The commercial relators note that several businesses, particularly restaurants, are up for sale. Most of the new businesses also opened in space that had been vacated for some reason.

Until we return to some kind of new normal, we will not know the full impact of the pandemic on our local economy. Let's hope for the best!

Please state the nature and location of the problem, as well as your name and phone number, which will enable the city to let you know what action they took to address it. If the problem is urgent, a city agency will immediately dispatch personnel to investigate. If not, action will be taken no later than the next business day.
