The Financial Advisory Committee (FAC) was established in order to advise the Board of Directors on issues affecting the financial position of the Association that may include but not limited to:

- Review the monthly financial statement, as prepared by the community management company (CAMP) and the Community Manager Review Repair and Replacement and Operating Reserves and make necessary updates.
- Focus on ensuring that our community operates smoothly and that we have a robust plan for all our future needs.

- Review Association's investments and maximize the return on our deposits and CDs.
- Assess delinquencies and collection policies.
- Recommend funding options for special projects and unbudgeted expenses.
- Assist other committees, as requested, with regard to the budget and/or other financial matters.
- Review the annual audit and tax returns as prepared by the Association's audit firm.
- Participate in the annual budget process and ensure that the different budget line items consider historical costs and the needs of the community as expressed by the different standing committees.
- Review the annual budget as prepared by the Community Management team for the Annual Meeting.

As Cameron Station owners ourselves, members of the FAC never relish the prospect of increasing assessment rates.

Common Area Committee


Fall is a busy season for landscaping, and the Common Area Committee (CAC) has been busy with turf maintenance and the completion of several needed tree and shrub replacements. Fall is the best time for planting, as the air is cool, the ground is still warm and plants can establish without heat stress. Winter flowers have been planted in common areas at the Duke Street entrance, Cameron Circle gazebo and in front of the Cameron Club.

Late fall is also a great time for tree trimming, which can help protect trees and nearby property from winter storm damage. The city maintains trees along city streets, and Lancaster Landscapes performs tree trimming on trees in common areas. The tree or trees closest to your home may be on your property, which makes them privately owned trees. These trees are the responsibility of the homeowner. If you are unsure whether a particular tree is on private property,

you can reach out to Management. Residents who would like to replace privately owned trees should submit an application to the Architectural Review Committee (ARC); replacement trees must meet guidelines outlined in the current Design & Maintenance Standards (DMS): https://www.cameronstation.org/images/CSCA_Design_and_Maintenance_Standards_DMS_Effective_09162021.pdf.

Please contact Management if you notice an area of concern in our community's common areas, including uneven bricks on sidewalks, dead trees or burned out streetlights. Management maintains a list of ongoing maintenance tasks and can help route items to the appropriate party. We depend on reports from residents to help address issues promptly.

It's not too soon to think of snow. Some winters we receive very little; some winters we receive a lot. If you need to purchase a shovel, we advise doing so ahead of the rush that comes with the season's first snow forecast, when many stores sell out of shovels. A smaller shovel (even one called "child-sized") may be worth investigating, as it is adaptable enough for decks and door entry areas plus light enough even when full of wet snow to allow the user to clear walks and driveways with less risk of injury. If ice melt is required, we recommend using a plant- and pet-safe formula, such as calcium chloride, magnesium chloride or calcium magnesium acetate.

Cameron Station Civic Association: Developments of Interest to Cameron Station

The Cameron Station Civic Association held its virtual membership meeting on Wednesday, November 8, 2023. Mindy Lyle (Planning Commissioner) discussed numerous initiatives affecting Cameron Station. Below is a summary of key points from a few of those matters of interest to our community.

Commissioner Lyle discussed the redevelopment of Landmark Mall that includes a state-of-the-art Inova Hospital and a diverse offering of rental and for-sale housing opportunities, including affordable housing, senior housing, market-rate apartments, condos and townhouses. Her best guess is that the Inova Hospital Development Special Use Permit will come before City Council for a vote in 2024.

Commissioner Lyle noted that the redevelopments of Landmark Overlook, across the street from Landmark Mall, is moving ahead. (For information on both Landmark Mall and Landmark Overlook, go to https://www.alexandriava.gov/sites/default/files/2023-01/EWLVD%20IAG%20 Presentation%2001262023.pdf).

In addition, the Vulcan Materials site is in the process of redevelopment (https://media.alexandriava.gov/content/planning/EWLVDAGPresentation20220427.pdf). She noted that there already is interest among local redevelopers for parcels of land along the corridor covered by the recently passed Duke Street in Motion bus rapid transit initiative. For information on Duke Street in Motion, go to https://www.alexandriava.gov/DukeInMotion.

Commissioner Lyle also discussed the Zoning for Housing initiative that was passed by the Planning Commission on November 1, 2023. This initiative involves nine proposals to change the Zoning Ordinance to create more affordable housing. A lively discussion of this topic ensued on the issues of density and on property rights. Public opportunities to comment before City Council was scheduled for November 14 and 18, with a City Council vote planned for November 28.

The Civic Association notes that, while none of the Zoning for Housing proposals will apply within the four corners of our community, they could have a significant impact on density and what is allowed to be built nearby. There are strong proponents of these initiatives, as well as equally vocal opponents. To get a well-balanced view on these proposals, go to https://livablealexandria.org/.

So, this month, I'll focus on the two types of projects the ARC sees the most throughout the year: roofs and windows.

For applications to replace windows and glass doors, always include a scope of work describing the style and exterior color of all your replacement windows, including depictions of mullions and whether you plan to use half or full screens. Pictures of the existing windows you're replacing are critical in helping the ARC understand your project. If the ARC can't determine which windows you're replacing, your project may be delayed with additional questions.

If you are replacing a patio or deck door, include the exterior color, a depiction of the mullions and a description of the door's hardware design and color. For roof applications, always include a scope of work from your contractor that clearly conveys the shingle type and color of your replacement shingles. Make sure your replacement shingle color was selected from Cameron Station's preapproved list. If it looks like your installers

may have to step onto your neighbor's roof to install yours, get their permission via email or signature and include that in your package.

The ARC strongly encourages homeowners to appear before the committee to discuss their applications and answer questions. No application is a "slam dunk." If you have a pending application, you should definitely attend the meeting. We are still meeting via Zoom, so attending is easier than ever. If you did not receive a Zoom link to the meeting, check your spam folder or email management's on-site Covenants Administrator Brandon Throckmorton (bthrockmorton@gocampmgmt.com) to have the link resent.

Always begin planning for your exterior modifications by consulting the Design & Maintenance Standards (DMS). The forms you will need to submit (the Exterior Modification Application, Private Tree Replacement Application and approved color and shingle lists), along with the latest version of the DMS, are located here: https://cameronstation.org/our-neighborhood/board-committees/architectural-review-committees/covenants.

In the past six months, Cameron Station has lost three important members of our community, all original owners. Thanks to their family members and friends for providing us with these memories.

In Memoriam - Linda Greenway

Linda Greenway of John Ticer Drive passed away in May 2023. Linda and her husband Pete were two of the first residents of Cameron Station; in fact Pete tells us they were actually the very first to sign a contract with the Cambridge Company, one of the ten builders of our community.

Linda and Pete were living just a few blocks away in Gretna Green Court when the City of Alexandria acquired the Cameron Station U.S. Army base. They watched as it was leveled and construction began to turn it into a premier residential community. An unfurnished model of their Cameron Station townhouse was enough to convince them that this was the place they wanted to be.

In 1998, they moved in with their beloved Irish Wheaton Terrier, Max. From day one,


Linda was committed to helping make this community something special. John Ticer Drive has always been a friendly, social block, and much of that is due to Linda's



enthusiastic participation in every Ticer event. She was often the organizer, but at the very least an attendee, at such varied gatherings as pocket park parties, chili cook-offs, toga parties, Easter egg hunts and St. Patrick's Day parties. Linda came up with the idea of giving out Halloween candy in the pocket park so neighbors could visit and not spend the night running up and down stairs to answer the door to Trick or Treaters. And it was she and Pete, along with neighbors Ken and Jane Schwetje and Gwen and Mel Lewis, who first put up the Christmas tree in the Ticer gazebo, a tradition that continues to this day.

After Ken and Mel passed away suddenly, Ticer neighbors began referring to the tree as the "Ken and Mel Memorial Tree" and

remembered them fondly as they decorated it. We are sorry to add Linda to that memorial, but are grateful for all the happy memories she provided.



In Memoriam – Gerry Hebert

Gerry Hebert passed away in September 2023 after a valiant, six-month-long battle against brain cancer. Gerry's strength, optimism, kindness and character are what distinguished Gerry in his personal and professional lives.

Gerry's life was one of service – to his family, his friends, his community and his country. Gerry and his wife Victoria moved onto Waple Lane in 1999 and quickly committed themselves to

In Memoriam - Edward Lifmann

Ed Lifmann passed away in August 2023, four days after his 101st birthday.

Ed and his wife Dubey lived in one of the earliest and most beautiful houses in Cameron Station – the stately home on Somervelle – which was modeled after the John Carlyle house in Old Town. Before they purchased their home in 2001, the community used the house for management offices and meetings because the Cameron Club was not yet constructed.

Ed was born in Rotterdam, Netherlands, survived the bombing of Rotterdam and the rest of World War II, and immigrated through Ellis Island to the U.S. He became a U.S. citizen and a very successful businessman. Much of his career was in international operations for major companies, which involved traveling all over the world.

Ed spoke five languages and developed a passion for travel – for years he traveled to Europe every four weeks and to Africa every six months – but his life was

dedicated to his wife and daughter. He planned elegant family vacations and prioritized his daughter's sporting events over business responsibilities wherever possible. Ed was an avid athlete himself. When age limited his mobility, and the big home became too difficult to manage, Ed and Dubey moved into a condo in Cameron Station, unwilling to leave the community they loved and had called home for more than 20 years.

While Ed's travel schedule made it difficult to be as involved in the community as he would have liked, he totally supported his wife as she organized Cameron Station neighbors for almost a decade to help the "Wounded Warriors." Dubey coordinated the collection of clothing, books, CDs and sundries for the men and women soldiers recuperating at Walter Reed Hospital. She drove to the hospital every month and spent hours with the soldiers as she distributed the donations. And every year, Dubey organized a bake sale to raise money for this worthy cause.

We extend our sympathy to Ed's family, especially to Dubey, and to his many friends.

building community. They created Martini Monday, where so many neighbors met and formed lifelong friendships. They were coowners of Food Matters, the first restaurant in our neighborhood, which was not only a gathering place to enjoy great food and drink, but was also often the site of charity fundraisers and neighborhood celebrations.

While Victoria served on the HOA Board and was its first president, Gerry dedicated much of his time and talents to Alexandria's premier charity organization, ALIVE!, serving as president, director of development, chair of the furniture program and Last Saturday food distribution coordinator.

Gerry's professional career was also one of advocacy and service. He was a respected civil rights and voting rights attorney, specializing in election law; he was acclaimed for his work on school desegregation cases. But it was in his personal life where he found the most joy and purpose,

as a devoted husband, father and grandfather, and a steadfast friend.

A few months before we lost Gerry, *The Compass* featured him in the Summer 2023 issue in "Neighbors in the News" – he was given an award from Volunteer Alexandria for his work with ALIVE!. If you did not know Gerry personally, we recommend you read the article, much of which includes words and thoughts from Gerry that capture well the good man that he was. 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

Meet Local Arist Nicole Gauvin

Nicole Gauvin has been a resident of Cameron Station for almost 20 years. For the past 10, she has been making art, but only recently has the neighborhood learned of her unique talents.

Nicole creates handmade greeting cards and artwork using "iris paper folding," a technique that has been around for decades. It's thought to have originated in Holland during the 20th century when people would cut old envelopes into paper strips and then fold and stick them to create a unique spiral effect. Each card has multiple layers of paper, with the center of the template forming an iris – a shape reminiscent of the iris of a camera lens.

Nicole elevates upcycled paper materials to make each card, which is an intricate work of art. She demonstrated this fascinating technique on October 25 during Wine Wednesday at the Cameron Café. Her cards and artwork are available at the Café, and she hopes to have more demonstrations in the future.

Inside Scoop: Key Takeaways from the Annual HOA Meeting

Alexandria Mayor Justin Wilson was the featured speaker at the Cameron Station 2023 Annual Meeting. He is working on the budget for next year and reported that the Metro faces a \$750 million funding gap, which comes from a significant decrease of rail revenue, with many persons now working at home. The Mayor warned that Alexandria will have to help pay the deficit. Riders may pay higher fares, and residents may see some taxes increased.

Much of the City of Alexandria's budget is funded from real estate taxes, and while growth has slowed, Alexandria's growth is 2%. The Mayor told the audience that Northern Virginia is second in the country in converting commercial space to housing units and private businesses.

Residents at the meeting engaged the Mayor on many topics - police and fire fighters staffing, problems with 911 calls, transportation on Duke Street, the transportation in the Landmark development and the conversion of the Victory Center to apartments.

The police liaison to Cameron Station reported that crime is up, but it is not random acts, but rather targeted victims. Law enforcement is focusing on hot spots of crime. Overall, Cameron Station is safe; the main issues are

package thefts and items taken from unlocked cars.

The Treasurer's report from 2022 was given an "unqualified opinion," which is the highest standard, and the HOA has set aside funds to maintain its operation. The HOA's funds are earning interest, which is important for the third year of the asphalt project.





At the Annual Meeting, four board members were elected. Andrew Hill, Joan Lampe, William Blumberg and Tom Kopko. The current Board approved a 2.54% increase in homeowner fees. Many residents attended the meeting in person this year, and there were also 60 people on Zoom.

ALX Jazz Fest: The City of Alexandria's Office of the Arts is proud to present "A Very Merry ALX Jazz Fest," a new





All Rice Thai

"Every grain of rice you waste in this life is one you'll be hungry for in the next." (Chinese Proverb)

There's a new, fun Thai restaurant in Kingstown! All Rice Thai, in the Festival at Manchester Lakes Shopping Center, offers an all-encompassing Thai menu with standard options as well as new creations. Chef Gahn has been cooking since she was a teenager. She is both "an alumna and instructor" of a premier Bangkok cooking school. Her creative touch yields beautiful culinary masterpieces that are artistic as well as delicious.

The space is bright, colorful and festive with imaginative themes, influenced by the homeland. The restaurant is small enough to feel intimate, yet large enough to rally a group of neighbors. The recipes are inspired by Bangkok's Chinatown (Yaowarat) and Kanchanaburi province. The owner, Katy, is delightful and welcoming and will assure your experience is positive.

There are many appetizers from which to choose. My faves are rather traditional: the Shrimp Dumplings and the Potstickers. A more exotic choice might be the Tempura Soft Shell Crab. The *All Rice* signature dishes are

made with their tasty garlic butter rice (subtle, not too much of either). Grilled pork and grilled chicken lead the way, followed by numerous build-your-own-options, including shrimp and salmon. Noodle dishes abound as well in as many combinations.

The Chef's Specials seem to be on a more grandiose scale (i.e., perhaps sharable) and authentically indigenous, as I witness many Thai patrons enjoying these - the Crispy Whole Fish, Lamb Massaman, Duck Basil, etc. There is also a Chef's Secret Dish, not described on the menu, but curiosity may prompt you to inquire further - always a imaginative surprise! I choose to end with Mango Sticky Rice, but there are several other tempting options...if you have room.





Libation options are endless, as they stock a bit of everything. They pour about a dozen wines by the glass, including my J. Lohr Riverstone Chardonnay. Beers, you should opt for the Singha or Sapporo. They've created their own take on some intriguing cocktails: Tom Kha Martini (coconut rum, passion fruit, honey, and cream); All Rice Blue Sky (vodka, blue Curacao, peach schnapps, and lime juice). They even have four flavors of milkshakes, and I would love to try the coffee flavor.

All Rice Thai is just a 12-minute trek from Cameron Station. Experience the artistry of Chef Gahn and indulge the senses!
